PRINTER Having progressed from apprentice to owner/proprietor of his own printing office, Franklin set up the first printing franchise. He was proficient in all forms of printing, with particular expertise in the printing of currency.

WRITER Franklin is considered one of our first writers of humor, but was also a gossip columnist and, of course, the creator of Poor Richard's Almanac—one of the colonies' first bestsellers.

SCIENTIST/INVENTOR Franklin's list of inventions and discoveries is long and varied, ranging from bifocals and the glass armonica to the discovery of electricity. Everything reflected his desire to improve the world around him.

DIPLOMAT The American tradition of citizen diplomacy began with Franklin, renowned for his ability to negotiate and arbitrate disputes.

POSTMASTER After Franklin was put in charge of the entire colonial postal system, he invented a carriage-mounted odometer to chart new delivery routes, he sped up delivery time, and he streamlined bureaucracy.

SAILOR On his frequent transatlantic sea voyages, Franklin devised the first-ever chart of the Gulf Stream; sketched new, more effective designs for anchors and sails; and studied the violent origins of maritime storms.

SWIMMER Franklin was an avid swimmer—did you know he not only invented swim fins, he came up with a method of "swimming by kite"?
